mont.

Personal, Social and Emotional Development:

- When your child is putting on/taking off his/her coat, encourage your child to pull
 the sleeves to the correct way (by putting their arm down the sleeve, grabbing the
 cuff and pulling outwards). This will help your child gain a growing sense of
 independence.
- We are learning about our emotions. Talk to your child about feeling happy, sad, angry. Play games of showing happy/sad/angry faces and encourage your child to have a go too!



Early Mathematical Experiences:

- Play some simple games with an element of **counting**. We have been working on becoming secure with the **numbers 1, 2** and **3**. A game of snap helps children to notice **similarities and differences**. You can make "snap" from Christmas wrapping paper backed on old cards.
- Get some **red** and **green** paint to let your child paint their own wrapping paper. Encourage your child to draw vertical lines **red**-**green-red** as we have been learning about simple **patterns** in school.

World Around Us:

- Make your own Christmas sand!
 - o 8 cups flour
 - o 1 cup baby oil
 - o Red colouring and glitter
 - o Mix together
- Talk about Christmas traditions in other countries e.g. it is sunny in Australia at Christmas and they may have a BBQ instead of turkey!





Language Development:

- We are talking about the very First Christmas Baby Jesus' birthday and the Nativity. We have been sharing Christmas traditions from home.
- There are some super Christmas story books read aloud on Youtube:
 - o Emily Brown and Father Christmas.
 - o Topsy & Tim meet Father Christmas



Physical Development & Movement:

- Using children's scissors, let your child cut wrapping paper and sellotape and help to wrap presents (even if it is only an empty box!). Scissors can be bought in B&M or Poundland or ordered on Amazon.
 Look at our website for information on scissor skills.
- In your outdoor area, get a large, soft ball and throw it to your child. Encourage your child to throw the ball back to you. We are working on **catching and throwing**.



The Arts:

- Get some inexpensive baubles, paint and glitter. Let your child decorate the baubles for a sparkly Christmas tree.
- Make and decorate Star-shaped shortbread biscuits with your child. (*Please see recipe on second page.*)
- Sing our Christmas Songs. Add some body movements and actions for fun.

Recipe for Christmas Shortbread:

Ingredients:

- 125g/4oz butter
- 55g/2oz caster sugar (pluse extra to finish)
- 180g/6oz plain flour

Method:

- 1 Preheat oven to 190 (Gas mark 5).
- 2 Beat the butter and sugar together until smooth.
- 3 Stir in the flour to make a paste. Gently roll out until 1cm thick.
- 4 Cut into stars/ snowmen/Christmas trees.
- 5 Bake in oven for 15-20 minutes. Leave to cool and sprinkle extra caster sugar on top.
